Every term new people are added to or removed from the Alpha group. You get to wear a coveted Bronze badge. If you stay in the Alpha group you can keep wearing the badge. The badges are Bronze in Year 7, Silver in Year 8 and Gold in Year 9. You get to wear the badge with pride!






Breaktime



On epraise there are milestones which make you want to work harder to reach your next milestone. You get milestones by getting a certain amount of epraise points e.g. Bronze 50 points.

Another way to spend your points is to donate to a Charity. The way this works is that each year group will choose a charity and then that charity will be put onto epraise so you can donate points to them.

Every question you get right is points for you. Whoever answers quickest, gets more points and the person with the most points wins. Good luck!






Languages




Open mind

Lunch Queues

The lunch queue is the queue you line up in for when you're going for your lunch. You can use a queue jump pass to skip the lunch queue. There are different sittings for each year group. The sittings change each week so you won't always need to wait as long.

What is a queue jump?

To get a queue jump pass, you have to earn epraise points by being well behaved and trying hard in lessons. This means you get to skip the queue. You can then trade your points for either a single queue pass (40 points) or you can bring a friend with you (60 points).

Hint: it's best to use it when you are on third or second sitting.

Rewards are available if you don't get more than 1 detention in a term. These rewards are themed to the holidays coming up. So, for Christmas it would be a selection box and for Easter it would be a chocolate egg.

What is Student Support?



Tutor Groups


