## School Uniform and Appearance Policy

## The Department of Education Sport and Culture's Policy on School Uniform

Individual schools will have their own uniform policy, which outlines what is acceptable and what sanctions will be imposed if the school policy is not adhered to. These are usually available on the school website or prospectus.

It is the responsibility of a school leadership team and its Governing Body to decide whether there should be a school uniform policy and if so, what that should be.

This flows from the duties placed upon all Governing Bodies by section 23 of each schools' Articles of Government to ensure that school policies promote good behaviour and discipline throughout the school. It is also for the school and their Governing Body to decide how the uniform should be sourced.

The Department acknowledges that a school uniform can play a valuable role in contributing to the character and culture of a school.
A uniform can:

- instil pride in the school, encourage pupils to identify with it and to support its ethos
- promote positive behaviour and discipline
- help to protect pupils from peer group pressure to dress in a certain fashion
- help to promote cohesion between groups from different backgrounds

At Onchan School we have a school uniform which has been established for many years. Our primary colours are royal blue and white. There is no necessity to purchase branded clothing but Parents/ Carers can, if they wish, purchase items with the school logo on from Promenade t shirts (Isle of Man). We have kept our uniform as simple as possible to enable Parents a range of affordable options.

## Girls

White polo shirt
**Black/ Grey shorts, trousers, skirt or pinafore dress
Royal blue cardigan, sweatshirt or fleece
*Black footwear
Blue and white check dress

## Boys

White polo shirt
**Black/ Grey shorts or trousers

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Royal blue cardigan, sweatshirt or fleece
*Black footwear

## PE Kits

White t shirt
Blue/ black shorts
Trainers or pumps
Outdoor clothing eg leggings or joggers plus a sweatshirt of any colour
*As an all-weather school we believe that footwear should be suitable for running and active wear. We complete Physical activity each day outside of specific PE lessons. If Parents/ Carers choose to purchase trainer style footwear these should be, wherever possible, black and without prominent logos.

## The importance of cost consideration

No school uniform should be so expensive as to leave pupils or their families feeling unable to attend school due to the cost of the uniform.

We therefore give high priority to cost considerations. It is important that uniform is affordable to all and particular attention has been given to the necessity for 'school branded' items which commonly attract a higher cost than unbranded articles of clothing. Branded items are a Parental choice.

In cases of financial hardship, parents should speak to either the Headteacher or Deputy. An "as new" rail of pre-loved clothing is available in the school library.

## Human Rights, Equality and Discrimination considerations

Some religions and beliefs require their adherents to conform to a particular dress code, or to otherwise outwardly manifest their belief. This could include wearing or carrying specific religious artefacts, not cutting their hair, dressing modestly, or covering their head.

Pupils have the right to manifest a religion or belief, but not necessarily at all times, places or in a particular manner. This may be partly or wholly due to a consideration of Health and Safety e.g. during PE activities.
Jewellery should not be worn in school other than stud type earrings for reasons linked to safety during PE lessons, active learning and outdoor play. This also reduces the risk of loss and upset to the children.


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## Personal appearance

Whilst we accept the rights of all children to be individuals, we also accept that children between the ages of 4 and 11 largely have decisions about hair colour and style made by their Parents/ Carers. Learning is our primary aim and ensuring that children are focussed upon learning. For this reason, we respectfully ask that brightly coloured hair and hairstyles that may divert from learning are limited to the school holidays.
Ear rings must be removed or covered for PE activities for Health and Safety reasons.
When the children attend swimming lessons, we follow the Health and Safety requirements of the NSC. Temporary coloured hair is not permitted due to water becoming contaminated.

## Complaints and challenges to school uniform policy

Disputes about school uniforms should be addressed directly to the Headteacher.
DESC has a complaints procedure in place to deal with issues which arise in schools such as a complaint about school uniform. This can be found on the Gov.im website and schools' website. Paper copies can be obtained from by contacting the Department.
